A. CERTIFICATE OF CANVASS OF GENERAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION.

Chief Deputy City Clerk Garietz gave a presentation as detailed in the Council Agenda Report. The City of Santa Maria consolidated its General Municipal Election held on November 4, 2014, with the Statewide General Election which was conducted by the County of Santa Barbara Elections Division. On December 2, 2014, County Clerk-Recorder Joseph Holland certified the election results. Based on the certified election results, Councilmember Jack Boysen was re-elected for another four-year term and Etta Waterfield was elected as a new member of the City Council for a four-year term.

B. PROCLAMATION – WILLIE GREEN DAY

Mayor Patino read and presented a proclamation in recognition of "Willie Green Day," December 16, 2014, in the City of Santa Maria to honor Councilmember Green for his service on the City Council. C. SWEARING IN OF NEWLY ELECTED OFFICERS.

Chief Deputy City Clerk Garietz requested that Jack Boysen step forward to take his Oath of Office. The Oath of Office was administered to re-elected Councilmember Boysen, and he was presented with a Certificate of Election.

Councilmember Boysen thanked voters for re-electing him and shared the following four main goals over the next four years: 1) continue improving the downtown corridor; 2) ensure safe and sufficient water supplies; 3) pursue a four-year university for the area; and 4) expand affordable housing in the community.

Chief Deputy City Clerk Garietz requested that Etta Waterfield step forward to take her Oath of Office. The Oath of Office was administered to newly elected Councilmember Waterfield, and she was presented with a Certificate of Election.

Councilmember Waterfield stated she appreciated the strong family values of the residents of Santa Maria. She thanked voters for electing her and promised to work hard to properly serve the citizens of Santa Maria.

H. VOLUNTEER OF THE MONTH

2. PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD:

Leonardo Espinoza, Jr., representing Youth for Young Adults, emphasized issues he believed Council should focus on in the coming year, including local water supply, aid for businesses that were flooded during the recent rains, and renewable energy to create a self-sustaining community. He requested increased street lighting in certain areas and safer markings near railroad crossings.

A. ORDINANCES

C. WARRANTS

D. PAYROLL

E. SANTA MARIA LIBRARY BEQUEST

4. NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF MAYOR PRO TEM

City Manager Haydon gave a brief presentation as detailed in the Council Agenda Report stating there were no formal rules as to how the Mayor Pro Tem was to be selected. The Mayor Pro Tem acts on behalf of the Mayor in the Mayor's absence, as needed. On December 17, 2013 Councilmember Boysen was appointed to serve as Mayor Pro Tem during calendar year 2014.

Mayor Patino nominated Councilmember Zuniga to serve as Mayor Pro Tem for calendar year 2015.

Councilmember Zuniga was appointed as Mayor Pro Tem for calendar year 2015 on motion by Mayor Patino, seconded by Councilmember Boysen, and carried on the following vote: 5-0

5. OFFICE OF INDEPENDENT REVIEW UPDATE

Police Chief Martin gave a presentation as detailed in the Council Agenda Report. In 2001, the Office of Independent Review (OIR) Group, a civilian oversight group, was founded by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. On December 8, 2011, the Santa Maria Police Department (SMPD) was involved in an officer involved shooting that resulted in the death of a known gang member and two police officers sustaining wounds as a result of friendly fire. Seven weeks later, another officer-involved shooting took place resulting in the death of an officer. The District Attorney's Office deemed the use of deadly force in the two incidents to be justified, however, City Manager staff decided to call for an independent audit of the SMPD.

The OIR Group was selected to do the audit. The OIR Group met with City and Police Department personnel, reviewed policies and procedures, audited training records, inspected citizen complaints, and verified whether or not industry-wide best management practices were being adhered to. The OIR Group developed 57 recommendations for staff to address. Based on those recommendations, Chief Martin indicated that 50 have been completed, 2 are currently being addressed, and 5 will be worked into the schedule as they require time to accomplish.

Chief Martin indicated that the Police Department has made vast improvements on the reporting protocol and procedure during Use of Force incidents. The Department plans to have met all OIR recommendations in the next few months, thus addressing all deficiencies mentioned by the OIR Group. The Department's sworn personnel will be 100 percent compliant in training requirements by the end of 2014. All recommendations regarding the Explorer Program have been put in place and the

complaint process has been amended to reflect appropriate changes, including a database tracking system.

Councilmember Orach asked if another progress report would follow in May 2015.

Chief Martin responded there would be another report in May when the OIR Group will return and make a presentation to the City Council.

The OIR Group Recommendation Progress Report was received and filed.

REPORT BY CITY MANAGER:

City Manager Haydon reported on items for the January 6, 2014 meeting to include an actuarial presentation from CalPERS, a public hearing regarding the Splash N Dash Car Wash on Donovan, appointments to various outside Boards and Commissions, and annual technical amendments to the Municipal Code.

ORAL REPORTS OF COUNCILMEMBERS AND OFFICERS (INCLUDING AB1234 REPORTS):

Councilmember Zuniga reported she attended the tree lighting ceremony, the unveiling of the Trolley in the Holiday Parade, the retirement celebration of Utilities Director Rick Sweet, and a Police Officers swearing in ceremony. She also presented Certificates of Appreciation to Eagle Scouts in the area.

Councilmember Orach reported he met with school superintendents regarding education projects in the community, attended the Holiday Parade, and attended a LAFCO meeting in Santa Barbara.

Mayor Patino reported she attended a Mayor's luncheon meeting, a meeting with Dave Cross and City Manager Haydon to discuss retail strategies, a Fighting Back Santa Maria Valley Board meeting, a meeting with a local art teacher to finalize an application for Bloomberg Philanthropies Public Art Challenge, the tree lighting ceremony, the Parade of Lights, the Day of the Farmer, the Freedom Monument Ceremony, a Rotary meeting, a quarterly school district meeting, the retirement celebration for Utilities Director Sweet, a semi-annual California Highway Patrol meeting, the All-City Open House, and a holiday open house at the Santa Maria Fairpark. She also visited Fire Station 1 to see the flooding that followed recent rains.

CLOSED SESSION:
