Community Programs Manager Coelho-Hudson expressed her appreciation to the City Council and City staff for such a rewarding career.

Councilmember Boysen commented on Ms. Coelho-Hudson's professionalism and thanked her for her years of accomplishments.

Director of Administrative Services Visé commented on Ms. Coelho-Hudson's heartfelt efforts to better the City of Santa Maria and acknowledged her dedication to her work and to the community.

Mayor Patino thanked Ms. Coelho-Hudson for making everything flow smoothly in the Special Projects Division.

Councilmember Orach acknowledged Ms. Coelho-Hudson's husband, Bailey Hudson, for his work with the All-America City Committee and several other City committees.

City Manager Haydon commented that Ms. Coelho-Hudson was an excellent example of a City employee; someone who had spent their career with the City, worked with several different departments, and carried the workload of a department that, in other cities, would have more staff members. He also acknowledged and thanked her for her work with some of the City's most disadvantaged residents.

Public Works Inspector Soares thanked everyone for the opportunity to work with the City of Santa Maria, and said he looked forward to working on future projects together should the opportunity present itself.

Director of Public Works Kahn congratulated Mr. Soares on his retirement and thanked him for his accomplishments noting the diversity of his knowledge in working with contractors on various projects.

City Manager Haydon commented on Mr. Soares' longevity with the City. He recalled how professional Mr. Soares was during SEIU negotiations.

2. PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Patricia Solorio, representing Central Coast Future Leaders, invited the community to the Santa Maria Valley Latino Legacy Awards event scheduled for March 20, 2016, at the Radisson Hotel, from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Mark Muller, representing the Santa Maria-Bonita School District, spoke about student success and the importance of parental involvement. He invited everyone to a school district open meeting (the second Wednesday of every month) to discuss how to allocate funds for the upcoming school year. The School District has received about \$35 million in grants that have been spent in collaborations with the City's Recreation and Parks Department and Police Department, Youth and Family, the Foodbank, Healthy Start Advocates, and many other organizations in the City; and he said community involvement is encouraged when it comes to making decisions regarding future allocations.

Tony Coles asked the City Council to provide more information to the public to ease some of the fears of the residents regarding recent violence in the City.

Mayor Patino invited everyone to an upcoming One Community Action meeting at the Grace Baptist Church on McCoy scheduled for February 18, 2016, from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. to discuss ways the community can help.

Anna Cremarosa, representing MIYB Spaces, spoke about the business and how it offers non-profits and entrepreneurs business support and office space to help them keep costs down. She also stated that MIYB was now a non-profit corporation that was expanding to offer more trainings and technical assistance in 2016.

City Manager Haydon encouraged everyone to visit the City's website to view the video from the February 2nd Council meeting where Police Chief Martin spoke on the recent violence in the City. He also reiterated the One Community Action meeting is to be held on February 18, 2016, at 6:30-8:30 p.m. at Grace Baptist Church.

City Manager Haydon introduced Director of Utilities Springer who gave an update on the City's water conservation efforts and local rain levels. The City continues to meet its conservation requirements imposed by the State. The conservation requirements have been extended through October 2016. With the recent warmer weather, water usage is increasing. Temperatures are expected to drop again which will bring water usage back down to its normal winter levels. Currently, Santa Maria is at 66

percent of normal rainfall for the year. Increased rainfall is still expected due to the effects of El Niño; however, forecasters are now predicting heavier rains closer to Spring.

The City Council conducted the second reading and adopted, by title only, Ordinance No. 2016-02 approving a modified Development Agreement for Western Sky Communities, LLC and DNT Properties, LLC.

Ordinance No. 2016-02 adopted. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA MARIA, CALIFORNIA, APPROVING A DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT (DA2014-0002) FOR WESTERN SKY COMMUNITIES, LLC, ON THE 3.99 ACRE PROPERTY LOCATED AT 1300-1324 NORTH BROADWAY.

G. INTENT TO ANNEX PARCELS INTO LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE

The City Council adopted a resolution expressing intent to annex 14 parcels into the Southwest, Northwest, and Northeast Landscape Maintenance and Lighting Districts.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA MARIA, CALIFORNIA, INITIATING PROCEEDINGS AND DECLARING THE INTENTION TO ANNEX TERRITORY TO ASSESSMENT DISTRICTS, PURSUANT TO THE "LANDSCAPE AND LIGHTING ACT OF 1972" (NAUMESCU DENTAL OFFICE; CALIFORNIA ELECTRIC SUPPLY; CLEANER EARTH COMPANY; TEMPORARY OUTDOOR STORAGE FACILITY; DIAMOND 'A' EQUIPMENT; WINDSET FARMS; HARDY DIAGNOSTICS; AND HAYWARD LUMBER & TRUSS).

4. SECOND QUARTER FINANCIAL REPORT 2015-16.

Director of Administrative Services Visé gave a presentation as detailed in the written Council Agenda Report. The beginning fund balance in the General Fund was \$10,122,000 as of July 1, 2015. On December 31, 2015, General Fund revenues for Sales Tax Receipts were \$67,000 greater than last year at the same time. NHIS revenue was at 44 percent of budget at \$783,000, which was lower than the prior year, possibly due to declining oil prices and the effects of El Niño. The Permit Revenue was \$1.3 million which was a slight increase from last year.

Expenditures included the annual fire debt service payment of \$653,000 for the payment from the Fire Department to the Solid Waste Collection Fund to payoff off the CalPERS Side Fund. Measure U revenues were slightly over budget at \$2,138,000 and expenditures were on budget at 49.5 percent. Through December, roughly 89 percent of expenditures were public safety related with 43 percent spent on Fire and 46 percent spent on Police operations.

Regarding the Enterprise Funds, the Water/Wastewater Fund revenues exceeded expenditures by \$836,000. Expenditures included the semi-annual debt service payment for the 2012 AB refunding bonds for approximately \$3,800,000. In the Solid Waste Fund, expenditures exceeded revenues by \$248,000.

Public Input

There were no requests to speak.

Council discussion

Councilmember Boysen asked about the \$90,000 being budgeted to purchase ten public safety cameras and if that money would impede filling the staff vacancies.

City Manager Haydon explained that, currently, there are several vacancies in the Police Department. The salary savings from those vacancies will be a one-time funding for the cameras, and does not mean the positions will not be filled.
