**D. EASTRIDGE ESTATES, LEGACY, TRACT 5939**

The City Council accepted as complete the street and easement tree improvements for Eastridge Estates, aka Legacy, Tract 5939, and authorized the release of the Faithful Performance Bond for Street Trees [#4394669] in the reduced amount of \$24,750 posted in the form of a Surety Bond.

**E. ACQUISTAPACE HOMES, AKA HARVEST GLEN, TRACT 5845**

**K. GROWTH MITIGATION FEE PROGRAM**

Ordinance No. 2017-22 was adopted setting/revising the Growth Mitigation Fee Program, and amended Section 8-15.06 of the Santa Maria Municipal Code to include applying a 50 percent reduction for all Growth Mitigation Fees, excluding sewer and water, for commercial uses in the Downtown Specific Plan area.

**4. TAX EQUITY AND FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY ACT (TEFRA) HEARING REGARDING APPROVAL OF THE ISSUANCE OF MULTI-FAMILY HOUSING REVENUE BONDS BY THE CALIFORNIA MUNICIPAL FINANCE AUTHORITY FOR THE BENEFIT OF PEOPLES' SELF-HELP HOUSING CORPORATION AND THE SIERRA MADRE COTTAGES PROJECT.** The City Council conducted a public hearing under the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act (TEFRA) and, after hearing public testimony, adopted a resolution approving the issuance of Bonds in the amount of \$11,000,000 by the California Municipal Finance Authority for the benefit of Peoples' Self-Help Housing (PSSH) Corporation to provide for the financing of the Sierra Madre Cottages Project.

Director of Finance Harvey gave a presentation as detailed in the Council Agenda Report. The California Municipal Finance Authority (CMFA) is a joint-powers authority formed to assist local governments with the issuance of both taxable and tax-exempt debt. Sierra Madre Cottages, LP, has proposed to obtain tax-exempt financing in an amount not to exceed \$11 million to finance the acquisition, construction, improvement, and equipping of a 40-unit affordable rental housing facility to be owned and operated by the borrower at 624 E. Camino Colegio in the City of Santa Maria. The City will have no financial or legal responsibility for the project. The responsibility will fall directly to Sierra Madre Cottages, LP. All of the documentation would have disclaimers that the loan was not an obligation of the City, but rather a private loan with the borrower and its bank.

Director of Finance Harvey closed her remarks saying that Carlos Jimenez of PSSH and Travis Cooper of CMFA were available in the audience for questions.

**5. CHAVEZ GENERAL PLAN LAND USE AND ZONING MAP AMENDMENT AT 1111 W. COOK STREET.** The City Council considered recommendations of the Planning Commission to approve a General Plan Land Use and Zoning Map Amendment (GPZ2017-0002) to change the land use designation from HCM (Heavy Commercial Manufacturing) to HDR 22 (High Density Residential, 22 du/ac) and associated zoning designation from CM (Commercial Manufacturing) to R-3 (High Density Residential) on a 0.2 acre property located at 1111 W. Cook Street, and a negative declaration pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

On November 15, 2017, the Planning Commission approved the item by a vote of 4-0-1 (Abstained: Commissioner Lopez.)

Community Development Director Ng gave a presentation as detailed in the Council Agenda Report. The project site is located on Cook Street between Russell and Blosser. There is a vacant single family house on the site. The applicant wishes to build a duplex behind that house. Across the street on Cook is a water drilling company and on the north side of Cook, to the west of the site is a carpet business. To the east of the site are a mixture of multi-family and single-family residences.

The Planning Commission met on November 15<sup>th</sup>, and there was some discussion about losing Commercial Manufacturing land space; but given that the existing property is residential, they agreed it would be difficult to accommodate an industrial use on the site.

Councilmember Waterfield asked how the new duplex would be accessed.

Community Development Director Ng responded that the duplex would be accessed, and parking provided for, through the alleyway.

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Gil Rodriguez of PCR Design and Consulting, representing Luis Chavez, stated that the applicant wished to make better use of the property and thanked the Council for its consideration.

**Ordinance No. 2017-23 introduced.** AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA MARIA, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING THE OFFICIAL ZONING MAP ON APPROXIMATELY 0.2 ACRES, LOCATED AT 1111 WEST COOK STREET.

**6. REPROGRAMMING OF EXISTING HOME FUNDS.** The City Council considered approving the partial reprogramming of HOME Investment Partnerships funding to Peoples' Self-help Housing (PSSH) to assist with the construction of the Sierra Madre Cottages affordable housing complex for seniors.

Community Programs Manager Narez gave a presentation as detailed in the Council Agenda Report. The City has participated in the HOME program as part of a consortium with the County of Santa Barbara since 1995. Santa Barbara County is the lead fiscal agency for the consortium, and the City serves as a sub-recipient of those HOME funds. Currently, the City is using the funds to administer the Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) program. This program assists low-income households with a one-time security deposit payment for rentals in Santa Maria.

In recent years, affordable rental housing has been scarce. Between July and November 2017, the City administered approximately \$6,700 assisting 16 households with TBRA funding. The City has \$230,000 available to spend by the HUD deadline of September 2019; however, staff does not anticipate using all of those funds for TBRA by then. Additionally, in October 2018, the City will receive a new allocation from the County as part of the HOME consortium. Staff has been working with the County of Santa Barbara to come up with ways to expend some of the funding prior to the deadline and continue to serve the residents of Santa Maria by providing affordable housing opportunities.

The completion of PSSH's Los Adobes de Maria III will generate 33 additional households needing TBRA funding. Staff proposes keeping about \$80,000 of the available \$230,000 for TBRA funding (which would carry the program through 2018-19) and giving the other \$150,000 to PSSH for the Sierra Madre Cottages project. Re-allocating part of the HOME funds will also benefit the Residences at Depot Street (80 affordable housing units for veterans and those with disabilities) as the County will then have additional HOME funds to benefit both projects. The City has already provided the project with about \$600,000 in Community Development Block Grant and HOME funding.

Councilmember Moats asked what the square footage of the Sierra Madre apartments would be, and if they would actually cost \$11 million to build. He said he was concerned when the cost averaged out to more than \$343 per square foot.

Community Programs Manager Narez responded that each unit would be between 700-900 square feet consisting of one and two-bedroom units.

In response to Councilmember Moats' question about cost, Carlos Jimenez, Project Manager for PSSH, stated the project would cost \$8 million in construction costs and an additional \$4 million in bond fees, attorney fees, and other costs. He added that the costs were not unusual for a project this size and were higher in Southern California. He said the State was also researching how to keep building costs down for new housing projects.

Councilmember Boysen commented that once Rancho Hermosa (47 units at the corner of Inger and McClelland) was finalized three or four years ago, the costs were over \$400 per square foot. He added that if a developer builds eight units or less, they are not required to pay prevailing wage for a competitive bid and there are other ways costs are being reduced, but not by much.

**REPORT BY CITY MANAGER:**

City Manager Stilwell reported the City Council meeting of January 2, 2018, would be cancelled. The next regular City Council meeting would be January 16, 2018. Items on the agenda would include the presentation of the Hometown Heroes, a retirement resolution, and two Recreation & Parks grant authorizations – one for the CalVIP grant for Youth Safety, and one for a soccer/sports complex. Other items on the agenda would include a public hearing for the Gateway project in the downtown, and technical amendments to the Santa Maria Municipal Code.
