City Manager Stilwell gave a brief update on the recent storm and mudslides in Santa Barbara. Locally, City staff had prepared for damage from the storms by cleaning out drainage ditches with the expectation of heavy damage from the rain. However, Santa Maria did not experience the damage that Santa Barbara had. At the request of Montecito representatives, six (6) of Santa Maria's search and rescue staff were deployed to Montecito to assist with search and recovery efforts. Four (4) staff members from the Utilities Department were also deployed to help with efforts re-establishing potable water. Police and Communications staff were also deployed along with the City's Emergency Services Specialist as the storm has been declared a natural disaster. Funding for the effort came from State and Federal funds. In all, 115 homes were destroyed and 242 single-family homes were damaged. There were 20 fatalities, 28 injuries, and 3 missing persons.

Mayor Patino called for a moment of silence in honor of victims of the recent floods in Santa Barbara.

4. ANNUAL APPOINTMENTS TO VARIOUS BOARDS AND COMMITTEES. Chief Deputy City Clerk Garietz reported the City Council would be making appointments to the Measure U2012 Citizens' Oversight Committee and the Santa Maria Community Television Board; and directing staff to continue advertising vacancies on the Board of Appeals, Landmark Committee, Library Board of Trustees; and any other committees with current vacancies.

Measure U2012 Citizens' Oversight Committee

There was one (1) vacancy on the Committee and one new application was received from John Childers, Jr.

Councilmember Waterfield nominated John Childers, Jr., to fill an unexpired term ending in January 2019. Mayor Patino appointed Mr. Childers, and the appointment was ratified by the City Council, on motion by Waterfield, seconded by Councilmember Cordero, and carried on the following vote: 5-0

Santa Maria City Television Committee

There are two (2) vacancies on the Committee. One (1) application was received from Incumbent Kathy Staples, and no new applications were received. Members are appointed by the Mayor and ratified by the City Council.

On motion by Mayor Patino, Kathy Staples was reappointed to the Santa Maria City Television Committee to fill a two-year term expiring in January 2020, seconded by Councilmember Waterfield, and carried on the following vote: 5-0

Staff was directed to continue advertising current vacancies on City Boards, Committees, and Commissions until filled.

PUBLIC HEARING

5. GATEWAY MIXED-USE PROJECT AT 101 NORTH BROADWAY. The City Council considered a recommendation of the Planning Commission to review a Downtown Permit to construct a 30,660 square-foot, four-story, mixed-use building on a 0.3 acre site at the corner of Main Street and Broadway in the Gateway District of the Downtown Specific Plan.

Director of Development Ng gave a presentation as detailed in the Council Agenda Report. At its regular meeting of September 20, 2017, the Planning Commission voted 4-0-1 (Abstained: Lopez) to recommend that the City Council approve Downtown Permit DT2017-0033. The item was brought before the City Council on October 17, 2017, and the item was continued for further study of parking options.

The site is a 0.3 acre site on the corner of Main Street and Broadway, adjacent to North China Restaurant. The applicant, Ben Nikfarjam, has requested tearing down the existing building and replacing it with the 30,660 square foot, four story, mixed-use building. The bottom floor would be reserved for commercial and retail, the upper floors would be 27 one and two-bedroom apartments. The changes that have been made since the item was last brought before Council include narrowing the ground floor commercial area to allow for one additional row of parking. This row, added to the row that was already proposed, would provide 27 parking spaces. Another change was that the number of units dropped from 31 to 27 allowing for slightly larger units. The parking spaces would be available to commercial tenants during the daytime and to the residential tenants at night. The elevations have not changed much since the Council's last consideration. Each upstairs resident would have a balcony. The parking structure and surrounding City parking would allow for roughly 200 parking spaces within a certain radius of the project.

Previously, there had been discussion of delaying approval of the project in order to have the Growth Mitigation Fee Program in place first. However, language has been included in the write-up of this item so that the Growth Mitigation Fee Program can still be included in the project if approved tonight.

Councilmember Waterfield asked if the parking spaces were standard size and if there was ADA accessible parking.

Director of Community Development Ng responded that there were 26 standard spaces and one (1) available ADA accessible space. She also asked for clarification on how the change from commercial day parking to residential evening parking would be managed.

Councilmember Moats asked if the item had been re-submitted to the Planning Commission for consideration since the last time it was presented to Council.

Director of Community Development Ng responded that the applicant could better answer parking questions and that the plan had not been re-submitted to the Planning Commission.

Applicant's Comments and Council Questions

Architect Alex Cuevas and Applicant Ben Nikfarjam indicated that the building size had been reduced from 33,700 square feet to 30,660 square feet since the last time it was presented to Council.

Councilmember Cordero reiterated Councilmember Waterfield's request for clarification on how the parking would be enforced and expressed concerns about the project not succeeding due its size and its parking issues.

Applicant Ben Nikfarjam responded that a manager would be on-site and that 2-hour parking was available in several locations around the site. He also mentioned that many people now use Uber and other alternate forms of transportation, and it was possible that not all incoming tenants may need parking spaces.

Councilmember Moats spoke about the project and commented that the larger units would allow the Applicant to charge more rent per unit.

Councilmember Waterfield asked if the gate originally spoke of in the first presentation would still be included in the project or if there would be a pass-through from Main Street to the alley which she saw as a convenience to customers.

Applicant Ben Nikfarjam responded that the gate was optional at this stage and would be installed if there proved to be a problem with security in the area. He added that the project would be a beautiful addition to a very visible part of town.

Written communication

Chief Deputy City Clerk Garietz indicated that no written communications had been received.

Public hearing

Mayor Patino opened the public hearing at 6:45 p.m.

Ken Hough, representing Santa Barbara County Action Network, spoke in support of the project and urged the Council to approve it.

Nancy Stewart spoke in support of the project saying she believed it was a great first step to developing the Downtown. She also asked for an increase in design on the west side of the building to make it appear nicer from the street.

Ernest Armenta stated he hoped the Applicant would pay the full amount of Growth Mitigation Fees (AB1600 Fees).

Having no other requests to speak, Mayor Patino closed the public hearing at 6:50 p.m.

Council discussion

Councilmember Boysen commented that he fully supported the project.

Mayor Patino stated she believed the project was a great first step toward revitalizing the Downtown area. Councilmember Waterfield thanked the Applicant for addressing the Council's previous concerns with parking.

Councilmember Cordero thanked the Applicant for his efforts, but still expressed concerns about the long term because the project was the first of its kind in Santa Maria.

Councilmember Moats commented that he believed the project would be beautiful.

6. SANTA MARIA MUNICIPAL CODE CANNABIS REGULATIONS. The City Council considered an ordinance amending the Santa Maria Municipal Code to prohibit all cannabis uses in the City of Santa Maria including manufacturing, processing, laboratory testing, labeling, storing, and wholesale and retail distribution of cannabis, except for medical cannabis deliveries from dispensaries located outside of the City of Santa Maria.

Assistant City Attorney Sinco gave a presentation as detailed in the Council Agenda Report. The City's current stand on cannabis use was established in 2013 when Council banned medical cannabis dispensaries. As the issue developed and dispensaries became mobile, Council approved amendments to Chapter 12-54 addressing these issues and banning all uses of cannabis except the delivery of medical cannabis to patients in City limits by providers outside City limits.

With the introduction of Prop 64 in August 2016, the City Council adopted an Urgency Ordinance banning the cultivation, manufacturing, processing, laboratory testing, labeling, storing, and wholesale and retail distribution of any and all cannabis products, except delivery of medical cannabis from dispensaries located outside city limits. The ordinance was then extended two (2) additional times in order to allow staff sufficient time to research a final ordinance regarding regulating cannabis use. The ordinance is set to expire August 14, 2018. Staff is presenting an update this evening that would make the status quo permanent.

Councilmember Waterfield asked for clarification on the delivery of medical cannabis, and how it could be monitored and distinguished from recreational cannabis.

Assistant City Attorney Sinco responded that the City requires a business license and signed waiver from delivery services and, although enforcement is difficult, those violating the requirement can be penalized. He added that the cultivation of six (6) plants for personal use in one's home was still legal.

Councilmember Moats asked whether growing one's own cannabis was allowed indoors or outdoors.

Councilmember Boysen asked if the requirement to grow personal cannabis indoors was included in the ordinance being presented. He asked if staff believed the ordinance was doing as much as it could to enforce the elimination of cannabis use in Santa Maria.

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Assistant City Attorney Sinco stated the ordinance could be amended to include the requirement to grow cannabis indoors. He added that the legal quantity a person was allowed to have was 28.5 grams (one ounce). With regard to maximizing enforcement, he said that stringent efforts could be used through the City. He added he did not know what measures the County was taking with their ordinance.

Councilmember Waterfield stated she wanted to see the most rigorous enforcement possible to regulate cannabis dispensaries, and inquired about billboards advertising cannabis sales. She asked if advertising was addressed in the ordinance.

Assistant City Attorney Sinco responded that advertising was not addressed in the ordinance. He added that regulating advertising would be hard to do as the City's sign ordinance is "content neutral." He said that staff would look into regulating cannabis advertising on billboards and offered to look into Prop 64 in more detail with regard to billboard ads.

Written Communications

Chief Deputy City Clerk Garietz indicated that no written communications were received.

Public Hearing

Mayor Patino opened the public hearing at 7:15 p.m.

Hunter Jameson spoke in support of cannabis regulations and the ordinance being presented.

Ernest Armenta commented that regardless of what the Council decided, cannabis transactions were already taking place in City limits and would continue to do so.

Kathy Staples spoke in support of cannabis regulations and the ordinance being presented.

Having no other requests to speak, Mayor Patino closed the public hearing at 7:24 p.m.

Council Discussion

Assistant City Attorney Sinco commented that he could confirm that growing cannabis for personal use did require that the plant be inside a residence and under locked conditions.

Mayor Patino and Councilmember Waterfield stated they would like to see deliveries of medical cannabis banned.

Councilmember Moats commented he preferred the ordinance as presented and believed medical cannabis deliveries should be allowed.

Councilmember Cordero stated he was in agreement with the ordinance as presented.

Ordinance No. 2018-01 was introduced repealing Chapter 12-54, Cannabis Regulations, from the Zoning Code (Title 12), and adding new Chapter 6-12, Cannabis Regulations, in the Public Safety and Welfare Code (Title 6) of the Santa Maria Municipal Code prohibiting all recreational cannabis uses in the City of Santa Maria, on motion by Councilmember Boysen, seconded by Councilmember Moats, and carried on the following vote: 4-1-0

Ordinance No. 2018-01 introduced. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA MARIA, CALIFORNIA REPEALING SANTA MARIA MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 12-54 AND ADDING CHAPTER 6-12 TO COMPREHENSIVELY REGULATE CANNABIS.

7. APPOINTMENT OF INTERIM ASSISTANT CITY ATTORNEY. The City Council considered appointing Wendy Stockton as an Interim Assistant City Attorney pending hiring a permanent, full-time, Assistant City Attorney pursuant to Government Code §21221(h) effective January 18, 2018.

City Attorney Trujillo gave a presentation as detailed in the Council Agenda Report. Assistant City Attorney Kristine Mollenkopf recently resigned. Recruitment for her replacement is scheduled to begin on January 18, 2018. Staff anticipates it will take three (3) months to hire a full-time replacement. City retiree, Wendy Stockton, has offered to serve in the position until a permanent replacement can be found. According to CalPERS rules, she must be appointed in order to serve in the interim position.

Public input

Ernest Armenta suggested that the City make the City Attorney an elected position.

Council discussion

There was no Council discussion.
